

Twin 2 X 2 Competition **Entrants Asked to Consider** Other Formats

The Competition staff asks that, if you are planning to submit twin 2 x 2 entries, please consider scanning them and submitting them as digital format images, or remounting them in wide format (7-sprocket European) RBT or other standard Realist mounts instead. Please note that doing so does not alter the Category (Contemporary or Modified) in which you are entering your images -- only the format is different. Note also that switching to digital format gives you the opportunity to make corrections and enhancements that you cannot do with film images. If you have not submitted digital entries in the past and need some help, please contact me, Oliver Dean, at: 1 (310) 635-2400 (24 Hours), or at 3dimages@sbcglobal.net.

Currently, to accommodate the twin 2 x 2's in competitions, we are having to complicate the judging process and go through the setup of a separate projector stand and Chief adjustable rack with two Ektagraphic projectors and separate polarizer supports. In addition, we have to load two separate circular trays correctly, find and attach power cables, adjust the two projectors, and be sure the judging gets sorted into the proper Category. All of this is necessary to show three stereo images from usually only one entrant. If we could eliminate the twin 2 x 2 format, it would save a lot of set-up hassle in the limited time we have on judging nights.

However, we do have the necessary equipment available for any presentation that includes twin 2 x 2 images. Furthermore, the competition rules do state that you may submit twin 2 x 2 images, so long as you submit all of your images for a given category in that format. If changing to an alternate format doesn't work for you, please go ahead and submit your twin 2 x 2's. We would rather have your entries than do without them just to save some setup time. Thanks for considering the change!

Eric Kurland's "Elevation" SCSC VP completes short 3D movie in record time

SCSC VP Eric Kurland recently completed production on a 3-minute short stereoscopic movie called "Elevation." Shooting with his compact dual TX1 rig running Stereo Data Maker (SDM), Eric shot the footage on Wednesday, conformed on Thursday, edited on Friday and delivered the film for screening at the July NSA Convention on Saturday. Elevation won a prize for Best Humor in the NSA Stereo Theater where it charmed the overflow audience with its fast-paced tale of an encounter between a clown and a voung woman on an elevator. Elevation was subsequently projected at the July meeting of SCSC and again at the August Awards Banquet.

Elevation was originally produced to complete an assignment for the Filmmakers Alliance of which Eric is also a member. The assignment required elements including underwear, a religious figure, a clown, a gun and one line of dialogue. On August 1 at the Directors Guild of America (DGA) theater for Digital Day 2009, Eric presented Elevation, encoded for Dolby Digital 3D on the 40 foot screen at the DGA where it was very well received. It subsequently was also included on the 3-DIY program at the Downtown LA Film Festival. Next up for Elevation is a screening at the Big Bear Lake Film Festival along with other 3D movie productions of SCSC members.

The banner ad is done similarly, but you'll only notice it if you move your mouse over the ad.

Cloudy With a Chance of

Meatballs to Be Released in IMAX 3D on Sept. 18

Sony Pictures Animation and IMAX Corporation announced that Cloudy With a Chance of Meatballs, an adaptation of the bestselling children's book written by Judi Barrett and illustrated by Ron Barrett, written for the screen and directed by Christopher Miller and Phil Lord, will be released to IMAX theaters simultaneously with the film's wide release on September 18, 2009 in both 2-D and Digital 3-D theaters. The special IMAX 3D release will be digitally re-mastered from Sony Pictures Animation's Stereoscopic 3D with IMAX DMR (Digital Re-Mastering) technology.

"Cloudy With a Chance of Meatballs" is a fantastic animated motion picture. Audiences will practically be able to feel the food landing in their laps. Bill Hader, star of "Saturday Night Live" and Night at the Museum: Battle of the Smithsonian, will voice Flint Lockwood, a young inventor who dreams of creating something that will improve everyone's life. Anna Faris, who recently turned heads as the star of the comedy hit The House Bunny, takes on the role of Sam Sparks, a weathergirl covering the phenomenon who hides her intelligence behind a perky exterior. James Caan plays Tim Lockwood, Flint's technophobic father. Andy Samberg plays Brent, the town bully who has plagued Flint since childhood. Bruce Campbell plays Mayor Shelbourne, who figures out that Flint's invention can put the town, and more importantly himself, on the map and Mr. T plays the by-the-rules town cop Earl Devereaux. The film also features the vocal talent of Neil Patrick Harris.

Up 2-D DVD

Up's Blu-ray package will be packed with features, but no 3-D. Walt Disney Studios Home Entertainment will unloose "Up" on Nov. 10 as a four-disc Blu-ray/DVD combo pack (\$45.99); two-disc standard DVD (\$39.99) and a single DVD. The title is the next major 3-D theatrical film that will roll out

without the eye-popping effects. DreamWorks Animation and distributor Paramount Home Entertainment also recently chose to bow "Monsters vs. Aliens" on Sept. 29 without 3-D.

Disney studios has included anaglyph glasses for such previous releases as "The Jonas Brothers 3-D Concert Experience" and "Hannah Montana and Miley Cyrus: Best of Both Worlds Concert," but did not for "Bolt." Disney is packing a lot of bonus features into "Up," especially on Blu-ray. Exclusive extras in the high-def set include "Cine-Explore," a visual clip montage illustrating the director's commentary; BD Live-enabled "Global Guardian Badge Game;" and several featurettes on characters Russell, Carl, Kevin the bird, among other items. The Bluray and two-DVD versions both include digital copy.

Disney 3-D Games

Guinea Pig sporting action title G-Force and Wii mini-game collection Toy Story Mania will both ship with 3-D support. In Toy Story Mania, gamers play a number of mini-games on the Wii using the remote. Among the 40 mini games are ones that have you throwing darts to pop balloons, throwing balls to knock things over and throwing hoops over object for points. The producers said that some of the games would include the option to play in true 3-D.

G-Force, of course is a game based on the 3-D movie. Both the Playstation 3 and Xbox 360 versions of the game will support 3-D graphics, which can be switched on and off on the fly. The games are in anaglyph 3-D.

2010 International CES Exhibit

The more experience people have with 3-D technology, the more interested they are in having more 3-D options. In the past 12 months, nearly 41 million U.S. adults report having seen a 3-D movie in theaters, and of those, nearly 40 percent say they would prefer to watch a movie in 3-D than that same movie in 2-D. 3-D technology is positioned to become a major force in future in-home entertainment and is becoming a major purchasing factor of TV sets. That is why the 2010

International Consumer Electonics Show in Las Vegas from January 7th through January 10th, 2010 will host another 3-D TechZone.

More Low Budget 3-D

As mentioned in August, get ready for low budget DVD's trying to cash in on the 3-D craze. "Sex Pot" in 3-DDD was released August 18th. From the same distributor now comes "Haunting of Winchester House in 3D." The 3D version will be available 10/6/09, while the uncut, unrated 2D version comes out a week earlier: 9/29/09. Advertised with red-right anaglyph glasses. This direct to DVD release is in a Widescreen Presentation with 5.1. Surround Sound and includes a Making of Featurette. http://www.theasylum.cc/product.php?id=160

But maybe worst of all is the rerelease of "Comin' At YA!" in noir 3-D! This film is probably the "Bwana Devil" of the 1980's 3-D Boom. They reportedly spent \$700,000 to convert it to digital 3-D. The transformation is complete, so get ready to run FROM a 3-D digital theater near you: http://www.cominatyanoir3d.com/production.html.

3-D will take longer to arrive in homes

Even though the panelists at the June Entertainment Supply Chain Association Conference session said lack of technology, standards, will slow releases. James Cameron is pushing for it much sooner. Many are predicting 2011, even though Futuresource predicts that 3% of U.S. households will have 3-D TVs in 2010, rising to 12% in 2012 and 45% in 2014.

Although 3-D theatricals have garnered healthy box-office revenue, studios will be wary of releasing the same films in the lesser-quality anaglyph 3-D technology that is now generally available for homes, panelists said. It's expected that 3-D enabled TV displays, required for theatrical-styled state-of-the-art 3-D, won't be in a significant amount of homes until at least 2010. Additionally, some companies are waiting for the establishment of at-home advanced 3-D standards, before creating hardware and software products that risk being incompatible with each other.

Advanced 3-D at home will eventually become a reality as TV manufacturers are relying on the technology to grow their display business, similar to the way the companies have previously depended on high-definition. It might be the case that some companies will

be so eager to launch 3-D-at-home products that they won't wait for approved standards.

IMAX 40 Years Old

Forty years ago this summer, IMAX creator Bill Shaw (one of three) celebrated the first pass of a 70mm film through an IMAX projector at 24 frames per second without the projector tearing the film to shreds. If he had only waited 40 years, he wouldn't have needed to worry about that, since IMAX is quickly opening as many digital screens as possible. I'm glad he went to all the trouble, nothing beats a film experience of a 3-D IMAX movie.

Night of the Living Dead – Again in 3-D

Razor3D had sold a poor 2-D to 3-D conversion of the 1968 "Night of the Living Dead" on DVD, but now the film has received a first class conversion to 3-D from PassmoreLab in San Diego.

"Night of the Living Dead 3D" can be seen in selected U.S. theatres and in wide release in 3D theaters in Europe, starting in October. "Night of the Living Dead 3D" will be available in anaglyph DVD on Amazon. com by Christmas, and a 3D TV version will be available when 3D BluRay becomes commercially available.



This was followed by the swearing in of club officers, and the Club Oath of all of the members present.

Traditionally, Oliver Dean has done the Club Oath ceremony in an entertaining way. For over 30 years this has involved him coming up with interesting, funny or unusual hats and headgear. However, always trying to outdo himself, in recent years he has gone much further, including writing an original song for a group sing along, and a special guest appearance by Ro-Man himself (the space helmeted gorilla from the 3-D film "Robot Monster").

This year, however, has to represent the most original and entertaining swearing-in ceremony to date. It began with the screening of "Stereo Trek" a 3-D video spoof of the original "Star Trek". Beginning with title graphics in the same font as Star Trek, and the original Star Trek music and sound effects, we saw the Stereo Chip Enterprise flying through space. The ship looked similar to the original, but with the upper disk part of the ship looking like a View-Master reel, with two large stereo film chips with the SCSC logo standing on the "bow" of the ship. We knew we were in for something great, right at the start! Cut to the first shot and we saw an amazing recreation of the bridge of the starship (done with greenscreen) and Captain James T. Quirk (FRANK ELMORE), Lt. Yoo-Hoo-Ra (MELANIE MARTIN), and Mr. Splotch (ANDREW GAGE), with voices of Spotty & Heffel-Fingit by Oliver Dean.

We hope this will be shown at a regular club meeting, so we won't give away the whole plot. However, it incorporated the Club Oath into the plot, which was presented as two parts, with the Club Oath in the middle. Needless to say it was received by a standing ovation. crew of actors and technicians for creating this presentation. It deserves a separate write-up.

The 54th Annual "SCSC Image of the Year Show" compiled by Susan Pinsky highlights the images that members entered in 2008-2009 club competitions. As the majority of images entered in competition were in digital format, Susan arranged for the few film based images to be digitized so that she could make them into a Proshow Producer 3-D image show. This artfully combined a musical background, while each image was presented with the image maker's name and title fading in and out over each 3-D image. At the end the award winning images were shown, The Most Promising New Member, Jim Staub's images were shown, culminating in the Image of the Year: "Eiffel Tower" by Jim Long.

Next we saw a very special treat: "Unseen Ellis Island" by Sheldon Aronowitz and Gary Shacker. From 1892 to 1954, over twelve million immigrants entered the United States through the portal of Ellis Island, a small island in New York Harbor. Ellis Island is located in the upper bay just off the New Jersey coast, within the shadow of the Statue of Liberty. In 1954 the processing center was closed, and the buildings were abandoned to decay. However, because the island was owned by the National Park Service, and not easy to get to, the abandoned buildings remained virtually untouched for all of the years until 1965, when President Lyndon Johnson declared Ellis Island part of the Statue of Liberty National Monument.

Ellis Island was opened to the public on a limited basis between 1976 and 1984. Starting in 1984, Ellis Island underwent a major restoration, and the spectacular Main Building was reopened to the public on September 10, 1990 as the Ellis Island Immigration Museum. Today, the museum receives almost 2 million visitors annually.

However, until recently, islands 2 and 3, where the hospitals, living quarters, and other buildings were housed, remained untouched in a state of fascinating and hauntingly beautiful decay. Even park employees were not allowed to visit those parts of the island. After 2 years of negotiation Sheldon got permission for him and Gary to visit those buildings, and to document them in 3-D.

The first half of the show is historic, consisting of black and white stereo images that were taken from about 1900 to 1920. This is followed by the fascinating images taken by Sheldon and Gary. Gary Schacker was on hand

to explain that in the 6 years since the photos were taken, all of the debris and decay that is seen in their images have been cleaned up, and broken windows covered, so that the buildings will be "stabilized" for future renovation. So this was a chance to see what very few people have ever seen, and will no longer be able to see. And they are so much better in 3-D than they would have been flat! It really is like being there!

Thank you to Sheldon and Gary for a very interesting and moving show!

Next we saw Eric Kurland's spectacularly interesting "Elevation." This is a three minute 3-D video created as an assignment for the Filmmakers Alliance. Eric had to follow the following rules for the assignment: The film should be under three minutes long, use primary colors, have only one line of dialogue, feature a gun, a religious symbol, and underwear. We won't tell you more, as this will be shown at other SCSC meetings, and we don't want to give away the plot! Suffice it to say that it is extremely clever, entertaining, and shows how great 3-D can be, even with equipment that is quite low cost. (Eric showed off his rig, which cost under \$1000 total).

"A Tribute to Bettie Page" by Susan Pinsky and David Starkman was shown next. Bettie was considered one of the icons of all pinup models of the early 1950's. She posed for many 3-D photographers during that time. Using Proshow Producer Susan took digitized 3-D copies of original 3-D Bettie images to create a dimensional tribute to a fabulous model.

The 3-D Center in Portland, Oregon has showcased the work of fifty different stereo artists in monthly exhibits since they opened in February of 2004. Recently these were published into a book, and this image show highlights some of the best images in a projected program entitled "The First Five Years - 3D Center." It was produced by Shab Levy. Representing 46 artists, working in many varied formats, from 6 countries this provided a full spectrum of images and techniques to round out the marvelous evening.

We have also been offered a four hour time slot, so we intend to augment what was shown at the Downtown Film Festival with other favorite offerings. In addition to a panel discussion, we hope to be able to conduct a live demonstration of capturing images, processing them on a computer and projecting them on the spot. This will take place on Saturday, September 19. Information has yet to be posted on the Big Bear Lake Film Festival website, but should be by the time you receive this newsletter.
